On behalf of the Pontiac Community Foundation family, we offer our heartfelt gratitude to our dedicated donors, volunteers, and advocates. Your unwavering support in **Building a Brighter Future for Pontiac** in such perilous times, is a true demonstration of your commitment to the people of this great city. **Together, you helped us steward \$972,102 toward impact!**

Pontiac Community Foundation continues to play a critical role in outlining the challenges and opportunities in Pontiac. More often than not, **we are sought after as an action-oriented organization, that “gets things done.”** Because of our dedication to results and impact, our work, focused on Neighborhood Investment, Economic Vitality, Civic Engagement, and Racial Equity, expanded substantially in 2021. Below are a few notable initiatives making an impact in the community.

- **Center for Pontiac Entrepreneurship** (page 7), focused on empowering local entrepreneurs, expanded through investment from Pontiac Funders Collaborative, PNC Bank, and most notably, the Small Business Association’s Community Navigator Grant. These investments in Pontiac’s Small Business Ecosystem are not only enabling us to provide direct support to entrepreneurs, but also launch the Small Business Roundtable, which will bring organizations providing small business support together to work collaboratively.
- **M1 Mobility** (page 10), a newly formed initiative by way of partnership with M1 Concourse and its philanthropic arm, Checkered Flag Challenge, launched to help those without transportation. By partnering with non-profit and community organizations needing help transporting youth to after school programs, M1 Mobility is making an immediate and significant difference, working against the transportation barrier that has plagued Pontiac residents for many years.
- **Mattie McKinney Hatchett Park Redevelopment** effort (page 4), raised more than \$350,000 towards redeveloping this forgotten city asset, named after one of our hometown heroes. Our board, staff, and donors have made significant investments in this project through in-kind and direct support. The community is also engaged by way of providing insight and input, and anxiously await the completion of the park, coming in the next year.

As you can see, Pontiac Community Foundation is making significant strides toward fulfilling our ultimate vision of seeing Pontiac as the premier place to live, work, and play. As Mother Teresa says, **we may not be able to change the world alone, but we can all do our part through “the ripple effect.”** Thank you for helping us make ripples in Pontiac, that will collectively make a lasting impact in the people of Pontiac!

Neighborhood Investment

We Build Community

Community is at the center of our work to improve quality of life for Pontiac residents. We support the development of projects in Pontiac that align with our vision to see Pontiac as the premier place to live, work and play. With a focus on Pontiac neighborhoods, we support inclusive projects that mobilize communities.



Goal

To create a vibrant and sustainable park that is well maintained and operated, promotes inclusive programs and facilities, and provides equitable access to all residents.



Outcomes

1. Contribute to the quality of life of the neighboring residents;
2. Create a way for families to connect;
3. Increase recreational activities for Pontiac residents;
4. Improve equitable opportunities for the community; and
5. Create a new space for community events and engagement.

Mattie Mckinney-Hatchett Park Renovation

Pontiac Community Foundation plans to utilize this project as a model for future park development across the City of Pontiac and will develop a blueprint for redevelopment. PCF believes strongly in the importance of our community feeling valued, and this begins with developing spaces for people to gather, congregate, and recreate. Throughout 2021, PCF provided multiple opportunities for resident feedback, including multiple stakeholder meetings, a resident survey, and door knocking campaign. Separately, PCF convened a group of key stakeholders and leaders to assist in the long-term planning and community engagement for this project.

In 2021, we held a crowdfunding campaign in partnership with Patronicity where we set a goal to raise \$50,000. If the goal was met, we would receive an additional \$50,000 from the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) in support of the park redevelopment. The crowdfunding campaign ran from September 15 through November 14, 2021. We raised a total of \$50,376 from 75 supporters and received matching funds from the MEDC.

To date, PCF has raised \$355K of the original \$400K budget for this project. This includes funding from Ralph C. Wilson Legacy Funds, Pontiac Funders Collaborative, and others. Construction is slated to be complete in Spring 2023.

Goal

Engage up to 350 Pontiac residents with physical activity and an opportunity for recreation.



Outcomes

1. Help address and provide an outlet of release for residents throughout the city.
2. Provide an opportunity for our youth to interact with others and play.

Pontiac Open Streets Initiative

Residents saw a need for improved parks and recreation spaces, creation of a bicycling infrastructure, and youth activities, as identified from a community survey. In response, PCF created the Pontiac Open Streets Initiative.

In partnership with Sheriff PAL, Oakland County Parks and Recreation, Friends of the Pontiac Parks Association and the City of Pontiac, Pontiac Community Foundation was able to implement our 2nd Annual Open Streets program. The Pontiac Open Streets Program took place at the following locations in 2021:

- Cherrylawn Park (Cherrylawn Drive)
– North Side
- Baldwin Park (E. Howard Street)
– City Center
- Shirley & Willard Park (S. Shirley Street)
– East Side

The Open Streets Program engaged 352 Pontiac residents with an outlet for physical activity and opportunity for youth interaction. Of the 352 participants, 278 were children under the age of 18.

Although the program was scheduled for nine weeks at three locations, due to weather each location hosted seven Open Streets programs for a total of 21, three-hour events. This resulted in nearly 4,000 minutes of recreational activity access for Pontiac children and families.

Pontiac Community Foundation anticipates growing this program in 2022 by hosting at least four events per week from June - August and impacting more than 500 youth and families.

Center for Pontiac Entrepreneurship

Center for Pontiac Entrepreneurship (CFPE) is dedicated to empowering aspiring entrepreneurs with the resources, skills, and connections needed to successfully navigate starting their business. We combine business training, leadership development, access to professional services, and funding through partnerships with a direct network. In the beginning of 2021, PCF worked with an expert in entrepreneurship programming throughout Metro Detroit to develop a comprehensive, long-term growth strategy for CFPE, which included the development of our defined pillars of Skills, Support, and Capital and further defined our convener role for Pontiac's small business ecosystem.

As part of the Skills pillar, CFPE partnered with T. Ramsey and Associates to offer three Entrepreneurship 101 courses to 44 small business owners in the City of Pontiac. Entrepreneurship 101 is a cohort-based program that guides entrepreneurs through the basics of starting a business, including topics related to Personal Assessments, Business Assessments, Moving Your Vision from Idea to Reality, and Legal Requirements.

CFPE provided ten grants of \$2,500 each to small business owners in the City of Pontiac, in June 2021. These grants assist businesses that have been negatively impacted by the COVID-19 crisis. Use of this funding is flexible as identified by the small business owner, with particular focus on utilizing funding for payroll costs, rent, COVID-19 expenses, and critical business operations.

Goal

Provide businesses the resources and assistance they need to launch, grow and thrive. Center For Pontiac Entrepreneurship will become a hub of entrepreneurial information for the region and serve as an anchor of entrepreneurial activity in Pontiac.



Outcomes

1. CFPE will offer programming and support services that meet entrepreneurs where they are and will provide a framework to take them where they want to go.
2. CFPE will serve as the glue for Pontiac's small business ecosystem and be its convener
3. CFPE will bring together stakeholders who touch and serve the city's small business community.
4. Provide a multitude of small business grants focused on supporting entrepreneurs challenged by the COVID-19 crisis and business expansion.

Impact

Anjna Goodwin, owner of Caked Up, used the \$2,500 grant to purchase a new refrigerator, a new stove and two new mixers.

Evan Monaghan, owner of Plain and Fancy Food LLC, used the grant to cover the cost of rent and food, as well as to help purchase land on Young Street in Pontiac where he plans to create a small urban farm.

Tina Caverly, owner of Tots Learning Center and Child Care, was able to cover the cost of rent and provide both an indoor and outdoor basketball rim for school aged children with her grant funds.

Sabrina Nichols, owner of Serenity Care 350, trained her staff to prevent the spread of COVID 19 and subsidized employee salaries

if they were unable to work as a result of exposure to COVID 19.

In October 2021, the CFPE provided grants of \$5,000 each to five additional organizations to support business growth or expansion. Office hours were held to assist applicants with the process and help ensure their ideas were competitive. In total, 62 applications were received and the following organizations were provided funding:

- My Nana's Kitchen
- Scribe Publishing Company
- Consult Chris LLC
- Seoul Rolls On The Go
- Raphael's Donuts LLC

At the end of 2021, Pontiac Community Foundation was one of two organizations across the State of Michigan and 52 nationally that received the first ever grant award as part of the Small Business Administration's Community Navigator Pilot Program. This two-year grant, of which CFPE will serve as the hub, will work with five spoke partners to support Pontiac small businesses through funding support, technical assistance, education, and training. PCF anticipates a significant expansion in 2022, including the start of their Pontiac Small Business Roundtable to guide the collaboration and strategy of entrepreneurial support organizations in the city.

Pontiac Impact Challenge

As part of PCF's Nonprofit Capacity Building and Support programming, we hosted the second annual Pontiac Impact Challenge. In December 2021, participating nonprofits were given the tools and resources necessary to engage community members in crowdfunding. At the end of the challenge, participating Pontiac nonprofits got access to a new base of supporters and learned a new tactic that they can use for further fundraising. Participating and winning organizations include:

- Kids Empowered - 1st place - \$10,000
- Pontiac Transportation Museum - 2nd place - \$5,000
- The Art Experience - 3rd place - \$2,500
- E-Community Outreach Services
- Accent Pontiac
- Catholic Community Response Team

As a result of the Impact Challenge, \$43,743 was raised from 150 supporters. Including the awards from Pontiac Community Foundation, \$61,243 was invested in Pontiac nonprofits as a result of the Impact Challenge.

From Terry Connolly, Founder, Pontiac Transportation Museum:

"Prior to the Impact Challenge, we had not run a crowdfunding campaign previously," said Connolly. "It was a very rewarding week, not just from a financial standpoint, but from a team-building view as we had many of our stakeholders get very excited about this, which undoubtedly affects their loyalty as volunteers or future continued donors. It also caused us to solidify our plans for the Legacy Wall, which had been loosely discussed among our team, but having the finality of the crowd-funding date brought the planning to a much more detailed level."

For the Pontiac Transportation Museum, the Legacy Wall that is being developed with the funds from Pontiac Impact Challenge is a critical part of communication to museum visitors - it will likely be the most prominent thing they remember. In that regard it will also be used for outreach with school children in visits, adults attending evening lectures, and high school kids involved in career technical education. The history wall project is destined to instill pride in anyone associated with this community, it is a very rich and important legacy unique to Pontiac.



Goal

Give participating Pontiac nonprofits the tools and resources necessary to engage community members in crowdfunding.



Outcomes

1. Host a crowdfunding campaign challenge among Pontiac nonprofits.
2. Provide financial awards of \$10,000, \$5,000 and \$2,500 to three participating nonprofits that raise the most funds from their supporters.
3. Teach Pontiac Nonprofits the skill of crowdfunding.

Racial Equity

We Eliminate Barriers

At the Pontiac Community Foundation, we believe that health disparities, lifespan and the ability to live a healthy, productive life should not be dependent upon your zip code. We also believe that Pontiac residents should have access to the same recreational, entrepreneurial and health support systems as their neighbors.



Goal

Ensure all residents in the City of Pontiac have equitable access to transportation, especially children and families.

Transportation is one of the most critical issues in the City of Pontiac with over 17% of Pontiac's households having no access to a vehicle. These issues manifest in a variety of areas, such as residents facing issues traveling to their doctor's appointments, challenges with access to healthy foods at a reasonable location, or even for the city's youth to participate in recreational activities.



Outcomes

1. Provide a variety of transportation services to individuals and nonprofits serving the Pontiac community.
2. Provide transportation for youth to participate in recreational and after-school activities.

M1 Mobility

To begin the M1 Mobility program, Pontiac Community Foundation acquired two 13-passenger vehicles to assist youth with gaining access to after-school programming, with our first partner being Accent Pontiac, a youth music program. From November 1, 2021 to the end of the year, M1 Mobility provided transportation for after-school programming for Accent Pontiac students for more than 75 rides.

Pontiac Community Foundation is focused on a multi-phased approach to implementation of the M1 Mobility program. The first phase of the program is dedicated to research, model development, identifying partners, and a pilot program with the community-based transit service. The long-term goal of M1 Mobility is to serve as a hub for all transportation resources in the City of Pontiac, ensuring increased access to transportation in the City of Pontiac. This program is slated for expansion throughout 2022.

Because of being able to offer transportation to students after school, we were able to move the entire program, and all of our staff and volunteers, to one location providing programming four days a week after school. Not only has this allowed students to interact with more of their community, but it's also allowed us to give our staff more hours and expand what we're able to offer.”

→ Impact

Accent Pontiac, a nonprofit organization offering music education to Pontiac youth, was the first nonprofit to partner with MI Mobility providing transportation for students from Pontiac schools to a central location for after school music programming.

Accent Pontiac has been offering music education programming to Pontiac students for the past seven years. Prior to its partnership with MI Mobility, after school programs were held at multiple school locations throughout the city, making it difficult to streamline processes, staffing and relationship building.

Currently, an average of 30 students are transported from local elementary schools to the program site after school. In addition, Accent Pontiac launched a mentorship program training middle school students to mentor and teach elementary students during their program hours.

“When we launched Accent Pontiac in the elementary schools, it was our vision to be able to offer middle school programs by the time those first elementary students were transitioning to middle school,” said Rowan. “It’s only because of this transportation that we were able to bring all of our staff and students to one place, and offer middle school programs and elementary programming simultaneously.”

Task Force On Racial Health Inequities

When assessing factors that limit quality of life for residents in Pontiac, addressing racial health inequities and disparities through a comprehensive view of the Social Determinants of Health framework is critical. Pontiac residents face an average life expectancy that is 20-years lower than residents in neighboring communities.

It is for this reason that Pontiac Community Foundation created the Task Force on Racial Health Inequities with the goal of creating a long-term strategy and action plan for addressing these disparities in the City of Pontiac. To accomplish this goal, members of the Task Force on Racial Health To accomplish this goal, members of the Task Force met regularly during 2021 to identify focus areas, discuss goals, and develop action steps to tackle major systemic inequities in Pontiac.

Goal

Create a long-term strategy and action plan to address critical health inequities by race for Pontiac residents.

Racial Equity

We Eliminate Barriers

The Task Force identified the following priority focus areas as the Social Determinants of Health with the most impact on the Pontiac community:

1. POVERTY

A system that has perpetuated racism and entrenches people in a generational welfare state, limiting economic mobility, creating a lack of opportunity and hope, and providing a detrimental quality of life. The normalization of elements of poverty into laws and policies force people into financial disparities, including lack of access to one job that pays a livable wage.

2. EXPOSURE TO TRAUMA/VIOLENCE

Exposure to early and/or cumulative trauma that negatively impacts someone's life on an individual, community, and systemic level and the long-term impacts on their view and response to society, particularly when that trauma is normalized, involuntary, and generational.

3. SUPPORT SYSTEMS

Welcoming, non-judgmental, culturally and linguistically relevant care, through programs, systems, community and individuals that understand the issues, and offer solutions that meet people where they are and empower people to achieve their aspirations.

Now that the action plan has been developed, PCF aims to convene Action Groups for each of the priority focus areas. As part of the action plan, the Task Force identified key partners, success metrics, and timelines for the listed actions that will be used to address implementation. Members will work over the next few years to accomplish these actions.



Civic Engagement

We Support Leadership

We are dedicated to growing the leadership of our community. Developing leaders for the future of Pontiac is critical to what we do. We also support an informed decision making process for members of our community by providing access to political candidate platform details for elections that impact Pontiac residents.

Pontiac Professional Grants

Leadership development in marginalized communities is key to any positive change on a local, statewide, or national level. In order to advance social and racial equity and improve economic conditions for residents in Pontiac, Pontiac residents must have the support, training and knowledge needed to not only be at the table but to have maximum impact at any decision-making table.

Pontiac Community Foundation, in partnership with Chief Financial Credit Union, awarded two scholarships to participate in Leadership Oakland 2021. Of 13 applications received, scholarships were awarded to Kermit Williams and Christian Marcillo, two Black male participants. Applications were reviewed by PCF staff and community representatives from Chief Financial Credit Union and Molina Healthcare. PCF also worked with Leadership Oakland to identify potential Pontiac applicants that could receive additional support to participate through other scholarship opportunities, leading to at least two additional individuals participating in the 2021-2022 class.



Goal

Engage thought leadership and develop leaders by contributing to the Cornerstone Program at Leadership Oakland.



Outcomes

1. Expose participants to current resources and issues impacting our region
2. Prompt participants to think more deeply about their individual and group leadership growth and actions.



Civic Engagement

Election Awareness Campaign

The 2021 municipal elections were critical for the future of the City of Pontiac with both the Mayor and all seven city council seats being up for re-election, in addition to the full board of the Pontiac Public Library. Pontiac Community Foundation is dedicated to enhancing civic engagement, voter education and awareness in the City of Pontiac.

To increase voter awareness of the candidates running for these seats and important dates and processes for voting in 2021, Pontiac Community Foundation developed a Pontiac Elections website to be used as an informational guide for voters as they seek to express their civic duty.

During the days and weeks leading up to the 2021 municipal election in Pontiac, the website www.pontiacelections.com received 1,915 unique visitors and 9,243 total page views.

Billboards encouraging Pontiac residents to vote were located on Saginaw and Oakland Avenue in downtown Pontiac, at the intersection of Auburn and Opdyke Roads, on Baldwin Avenue near Longfellow, on Saginaw and Montcalm, and Joslyn Avenue and First Street. 33% of the visits to our Pontiac Elections website were from search engines and 30% were from direct traffic, directly related to the billboard and other advertising.

As a result of the collective efforts of many organizations working to increase voter turnout in Pontiac, MI, such as Oakland Forward, Pontiac United and the Pontiac Housing Commission, we had more than 7,500 registered voters cast their ballot for the 2021 Pontiac municipal election, an increase of approximately 2,000 voters from previous municipal elections.



Goal

Increase awareness and engagement in the City of Pontiac regarding civic initiatives, including municipal elections, elements of the charter and leadership.



Outcomes

1. Provide Pontiac residents a nonpartisan website outlining candidates for upcoming elections, important dates to be aware of, etc.
2. Sponsor a Candidate Series with Oakland County Times to further educate Pontiac residents about political candidates.
3. Provide a billboard awareness campaign that will remind residents of important dates and to get out and vote.
